Vision Statement

This policy is aligned with the following: 'Inclusive Invitational Inspiring': Collective Worship in Church of England Schools Guidance Document.¹

The daily act of Collective Worship is a legal requirement in all schools. As a Church of England School, worship at St Dunstan's School should always be Christian and reflect the traditions of the Church of England, developing learners' experience and understanding of Anglican traditions and practice.

Collective Worship should make a major contribution to upholding and supporting the religious character and Christian distinctiveness of a church school. It should be an expression of the school's Christian vision and the heartbeat of the school. The importance of worship therefore must be relevant and central to its life.

Collective Worship should be of the highest quality as an offering to God. It should aim to inspire and affect pupils and adults. Through Collective Worship,

pupils and adults should be offered an encounter with Jesus Christ and with Christian faith and practice in a way that enhances their lives.

Collective Worship should promote spiritual growth in all participants whatever their faith or none. There should be opportunity for everyone in the school to participate, including the chance for all pupils to plan and lead worship. There needs to be opportunities to:

- unpack and explore the school's Christian vision:
 - St Dunstan's: Guided and Inspired by God to Love, Trust, Hope and Serve;
- experience the richness and beauty of Anglican liturgy;
- sing, pray, be silent and give praise and thanksgiving to God;
- reflect on the attributes of God and on the teachings of Jesus Christ;
- listen to and learn from The Holy Bible;
- celebrate the seasons and festivals in the liturgical calendar;
- share each other's joys and challenges;
- offer a prayerful and worshipful context around local, national and international situations and events;
- foster respect and unity, helping the community to live well together;
- deepen spiritual awareness and reflection;
- in Key Stage 2, experience services of The Eucharist in school or at St Dunstan's church at least once every half term.

Collective Worship should influence the thinking and day-to-day actions of the whole school community outside the act of Collective Worship itself. It should have a profound impact on school life and on the daily lives of the members of the school community both inside and outside school.

A designated person should be responsible for co-ordinating Collective Worship provision in the school. There should be a partnership either with the Rector or a designated member of the parish clergy in developing and leading the school's programme of Collective Worship. Use should be made of St Dunstan's church for some worship. There needs to be professional development, support and resources to equip all staff in leading quality collective worship.

For Collective Worship to be truly effective and make a full contribution to the Christian distinctiveness of the school, it is an expectation that the whole school community should be included. In particular, no pupils should be excluded as experiencing daily Collective Worship is their entitlement and an important aspect of being part of a church school.

For Collective Worship to be excellent, there should be a clear structure which includes creative

and thorough planning and a formal system of evaluation. The Faith Group will monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of Collective Worship policy and practice at its regular meetings. The Faith Group should have regard for Church of

England guidance and the framework of the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools, through which the impact of Collective Worship will be inspected.

It is expected that by working in a Church of England school, the staff will share the vision and distinctive Christian ethos of the school and readily participate in Collective Worship. Although legally parents/carers have the option of withdrawing their children from Collective Worship, it is hoped that by applying to a church school, parents/carers understand the school's distinctive Christian character. Parents/carers hopefully would therefore recognise Collective Worship as central to the life of the school and not feel it necessary to withdraw their child. For these reasons it is vital that the aims of Collective Worship are properly understood by the whole school community and that although the Collective Worship is clearly of a Christian nature, it is inclusive and affirming and therefore seen as relevant for all pupils in our diocesan Church of England schools.

Above all, Collective Worship should be the relevant and essential component of an education that enables all to flourish and to 'live life in all its fullness' (John 10:10).
