Vision Statement

Rationale

Our mission statement reflects our belief in encouraging the development of our pupils in a broad range of educational, emotional and spiritual dimensions. We believe that to achieve the aims of our mission statement the school need to work in partnership with parents to enable children to gain maximum benefit from their education. Parent helpers are an important and valued part of the team at St Dunstan's. Please see also our Equalities policy.

Purpose of the Policy

To provide a supportive and consistent framework in which we can engage parents meaningfully in the education of their children and in the wider life of the school.

Principles Underlying the Policy

- Parental involvement will take place in a climate of mutual trust.
- Parents and all staff are partners in the education process.
- Parental involvement should be inclusive and all parents and carers should be encouraged to participate.
- Effective co-operation between parents and school will maximise opportunities for learning.

Parent Helpers

- Staff should actively encourage the involvement of parent volunteers.
- Parent volunteers provide the opportunity for pupils to witness parents and school working together in partnership to enrich learning experiences.
- The benefits for the children are visible signs of school and home working together to enrich their learning experiences, additional assistance with tasks, more opportunities to work in small groups and extra supervision for practical activities.
- The benefits for parents are a greater understanding of the life of the school, a broader understanding of children's learning, the sharing of skills and the gaining of experience and confidence in working with children.
- The benefits for the school can include improved communication between parents and the school, the sharing of the aims and ethos of the school, and the enrichment of the learning environment.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement

In the classroom:

- reading activities individual reading, reading stories, group activities, phonic games etc.
- art activities
- Design and technology activities
- Practical maths and science
- Craft activities
- Supervising board games
- Assisting with outside activities

Outside the classroom:

- Mounting work and preparing displays
- Accompanying classes to church and trips
- Assisting in the library
- Other tasks to assist teachers repairing and covering books, preparing resources, tidying reading areas etc.

Additional Information

- A register of parent helpers will be updated termly.
- Parents wishing to help in school will be asked to make a regular commitment and will need to attend a parent helper training meeting. Offers of help will be subject to parents undergoing a satisfactory DBS check.
- Parents are asked not to speak to teachers about matters regarding their own child when they are in school helping but to make a mutually convenient time.

Confidentiality

Parents helping in school must respect the children's/school's right to confidentiality and understand that matters arising in school are not to be discussed outside school with other people under any circumstances. Any queries parent helpers may have regarding school matters must be directed to the class teacher in the first instance or to one of the leadership team. Parents sign a confidentiality agreement before commencing work in school.
