- Physical Development
- Personal, Social and Emotional Development
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

The Characteristics of Effective Teaching and Learning.

- The characteristics of effective teaching and learning are a statutory requirement of the EYFS.
- They detail the ways in which children should be learning from their environment, from their experiences and from activities they engage in.



- playing and exploring children investigate and experience things, and 'have a go'
- active learning children concentrate and keep on trying if they encounter difficulties, and enjoy achievements
- creating and thinking critically children have and develop their own ideas, make links between ideas, and develop strategies for doing things



Attaining the Early Learning Goals (ELG) and the Good Level of Development (GLD)

- At the end of Reception we assess the children using the early learning goals found in the early years framework.
- We make 'best fit' judgements 'emerging' or 'expected'.
- We do not test the children. Our assessments are based on classroom observations.
- In order to attain a 'Good Level of Development' a child must attain the Early Learning Goals in all of the Prime Areas of Learning and in the Specific Areas of Literacy and Mathematics.


Phonics

We teach phonics daily and follow the Little Wandle Letters and Sounds (Revised) synthetic phonics programme.

We will let you know which sounds we are teaching the children so that you can support us and your child by reviewing and practising these at home. When practising sounds it is important that you teach the 'soft' sounds.


- We also focus on the skills of blending and segmenting. These are the skills that the children need for both reading and writing.
- We will also be learning 'high frequency' and 'tricky' words (these are words that cannot easily be de-coded). We will let you know which words we are learning so that you can also practise these at home.

Reading – Decodable Books





- Wordless books the children will all start with wordless books. These books tell the story in pictures and provide lots of wonderful opportunities for talking about stories, story structure, developing vocabulary and making up stories too.
- Once your child has mastered the first set of phonic sounds and is becoming more confident with blending, fully decodable reading books will be introduced. This reading practise book will be at the correct phonic stage for your child.
- Your child should be able to read this book independently.

Reading at home

Please remember that the book that is sent home will already have been read at school and it will be at the correct reading level for your child. We recommend that you read the book and celebrate your child's growing confidence. You can ensure that your child is reading the words fluently, using their developing decoding skills, retelling the story, discussing the characters. In this way you can encourage good opportunities for discussion, comprehension and understanding.



New books will go out on Fridays and a phonics activity will be sent home on a Monday to be completed during the week (based on the previous week's phonics learning).

Once a week your child will also bring home a 'sharing book' from our school or class library. Your child will not be able to read this on their own. This book is for you both to read and enjoy together.

Ultimately we want all of our children to become 'lifelong readers' and it is important that you continue to read for pleasure - children enjoy listening to favourite stories over and over again, visiting the local library, making their own choices about which story or information book to read. Have fun together and enjoy learning new facts or making up voices for story book characters.





Please date and sign the reading record book every time you read with your child, adding a brief comment to let us know how your child is getting on.

Please remember this is also the home-school communication book.

Please send these into school everyday.

<u>Mathematics</u>

- We follow White Rose Maths.
- We teach maths daily
- There are lots of opportunities for counting accurately, matching numerals to quantity and problem solving
- We learn through practical work play, art, outdoor activities involving numbers and shapes
- We play interactive whiteboard games
- We encourage investigations
- We read stories and base activities involving numbers and patterns on stories

 say. Listening, Attention and Understanding and Speaking are crucial to
 the curriculum.
- Speaking about and from their own experiences helps to build children's confidence.
